Guiding and supporting HERCULES scientists in community engagement



Stakeholder Advisory Board

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Exposome Roadshow and Community Grant Program



We maintained an active <u>Stakeholder Advisory Board</u> made up of local residents, non-profits, government agencies, and academic partners. Our

After a pilot period, we officially launched our new <u>Shaheed DuBois</u> <u>Exposome Roadshow and Community Grant Program</u>, a new and (we think) improved version of our past Community Grant Program. We're very excited about this new model, which lasts 3 years and allows us to share the exposome concept with communities, learn about their exposomerelated concerns, and provide them with financial and technical support to address those concerns.

We have been busy supporting community-engaged research! Two highlights:



Supporting Community Engaged Research

New <u>CEC Services for HERCULES Investigators</u>: Investigators can request support services on the HERCULES website, including, for example, facilitating partnerships and consultation on reporting-back and clearly communicating research results.

Facilitating partnerships: we connected a HERCULES SAB member with researchers Eri Saikawa and Sam Peters, which has resulted in a HERCULES Pilot Grant leading to actionable results around soil contamination within a local Atlanta community.

New <u>Community Engagement Awards</u> for HERCULES partners and Faculty: Congratulations to our inaugural award recipients, Karla Blaginin (SAB Member) and Dana Boyd Barr (HERCULES Faculty)!



Research Translation and Communication

We strive to translate HERCULES research into language and formats that is clear and relevant to local Atlanta communities. We now have 7 research translations available on the <u>HERCULES website</u>, and we offer research summary and infographic creation as one of our <u>CEC Services</u>!

In addition to our planned activities, we participate in outreach activities that pop up throughout the year. One particular highlight was our support of a local community who came to us with air quality concerns.



Additional Community Outreach

In partnership with that community and Dr. Dana Boyd Barr, we were able to systematically document the community's odor concerns, borrow VOC air monitoring equipment and train the community members to use it, and compile the VOC data into a report that the community could use.

We also co-planned and hosted a community conversation for <u>WonderRoot's Off the Wall initiative</u>, joined the newly designated <u>Greater</u> <u>Atlanta UN Regional Centre of Expertise on Education for Sustainable</u> <u>Development</u>, and presented on the importance of community engagement at the Georgia Environmental Conference, to name a few!
