Dr. Stephanie Eick is an environmental and reproductive epidemiologist. She completed her PhD in epidemiology from the University of Georgia, MPH in epidemiology from Emory University, and postdoctoral training in environmental health with the Program on Reproductive Health and the Environment at the University of California, San Francisco. Her research focuses on the health effects of environmental chemical and non-chemical (i.e., psychosocial) stressors during pregnancy. She is interested in joint effects and understanding how non-chemical stressors can amplify the harmful effects of chemicals. She is also interested in biomarkers of stress response, such as oxidative stress and inflammation, and better understanding the biological mechanisms leading to adverse pregnancy and child health outcomes. In this seminar, Dr. Eick will discuss her research in this area with examples from prospective birth cohorts.
